## First Grade Summer Math Review Calendar June 2017

Dear Families,

Research shows that most students lose about two months worth of skills in mathematics during the summer months. You can help stop this from happening! For each day on the calendar, there is a question, problem, or activity for your child to do at home that will help to review the concepts covered during the school year. These concepts will be built upon as your child enters the next grade level. Encourage your child to explain to you what they know and to show their thinking using words, numbers, and pictures. Please initial each day of the calendar as your child completes each task. Your initials will indicate that your child not only did the task, but that you also talked about it together and/or looked at their work and that they solved it correctly.

Your child is encouraged to return the math review calendar to his or her new teacher by September 5, 2017 with all of the days initialed. He/she will receive a prize. I hope you enjoy letting your child show you how much they've learned!

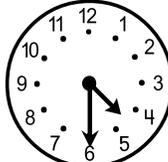
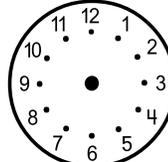
