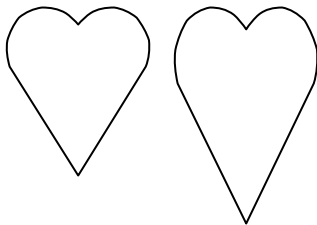

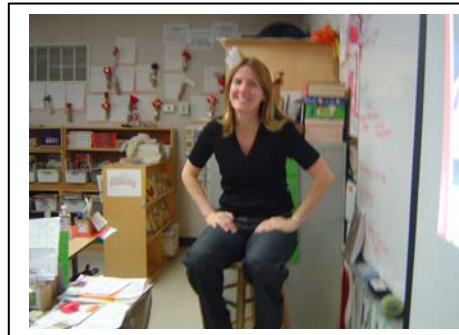
Principal's Message

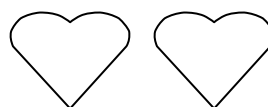
activities they do. She will be greatly missed.

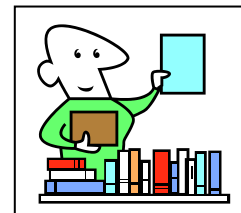

Earlier this month our teachers held a protest outside of our school. Even though our teachers voted *not* to walk out of their classrooms, they still are not happy about the decisions of the school district. The purpose of the protest was to make people aware that the district is making cuts that'll hurt students. Our teachers realize that there is a budget problem in our state right now, but they'd rather see money taken from the downtown offices than from local schools because cuts at the schools directly help students.

At our school, budget cuts are going to mean that we lose money for art supplies, art lessons, and field trips. Worse yet, we're going to lose our Assistant Principal, Mr. Esquenazi, and three great teachers: Ms. Cain, Ms. Steele, and Ms. French. We think it's wrong to lose those people because they are nice and try to help kids learn all the time.

We interviewed our school's Lead Teacher, Mr. Reidman. He said that teachers don't think it's a good idea to increase class size, or fire teachers because those things hurt students. He said that the protest is important for public awareness of what is happening in the Los Angeles educational system. People need to know how important this situation is for our schools. We children are the future. We are the next generation for the world.

We learned that all of the teachers were wearing black to show that all of the teachers are standing together. It is upsetting that some great teachers are going to lose their jobs. All of the teachers are worried about it. We are, too. LAUSD is making our school lose teachers, making classrooms more crowded, hurting education for students, and giving us less supplies that we need. By walking in front of the school holding signs of protest, our teachers hope that LAUSD decided to do the right thing and make students come first. We think the protest is important because expressing your rights can make a huge difference to our school!

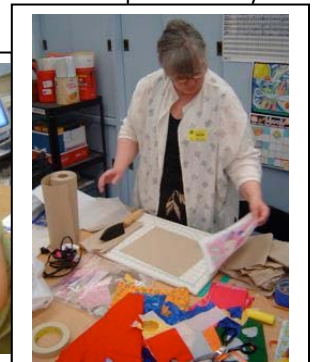

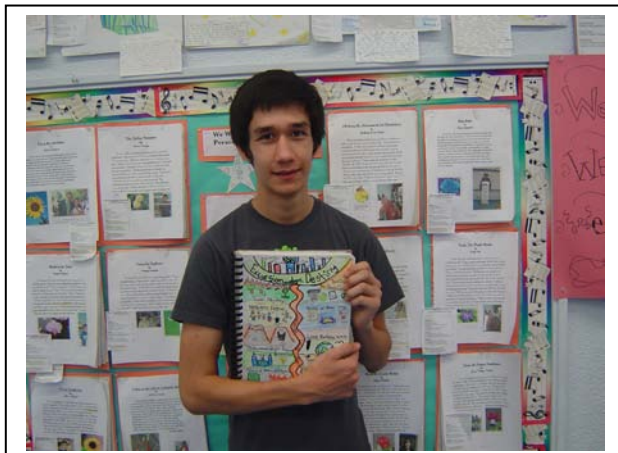

Are You an Accelerated Reader

Did you know that Toluca Lake Elementary has an online reading incentive program? It is called **Accelerated Reader (AR)**. AR is a computerized progress-monitoring system that promotes **guided independent reading practice**. The Accelerated Reader software serves three primary purposes: 1) AR provides quick and accurate assessments of whether students have understood / comprehended books they have read. 2) It assigns point values for each AR Reading Practice Quiz taken. Point values are a factor of book level and performance on quizzes. (For example, an easy book like Hop on Pop by Dr. Seuss is 0.5 points while Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire by J.K. Rowling is 32.0 points.) Points accumulate during the school year, and are a way for teachers, students, and parents to monitor the students' reading volume. 3) The system tracks student performance on AR quizzes over time. 4) AR provides a way for educators, students, and parents to monitor and guide reading practice and ensure success for the child through goal setting. 5) Students also get special incentives for their reading. Some incentives include: pencils, folders, Toluca Lake Accelerated Reader bumper sticker, and free kids meals to restaurants like Islands, Fuddruckers, Elephant Bar Restaurant, California Pizza Kitchen, and HomeTown Buffet.
