Last month we students were able to see an amazing sight from our playground. We were able to see a huge airplane carrying the retired space shuttle Endeavor on its way to the CA Science Center in Los Angeles.

Endeavor is so big that it had three jets escorting it. This was the last time anybody will see a space shuttle fly because that program has been retired by NASA (the National Aeronautics and Space Administration). Now, the shuttles will be in a few museums for people to visit and explore. We're lucky to have Endeavor right here in Los Angeles.

Seeing Endeavor fly in the sky above us was a once in a lifetime chance. It flew all the way from the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. NASA originally authorized the Endeavour in 1987. It

replaced Challenger, a shuttle that had a bad accident. Endeavour flew missions in space from 1992 until 2011. Watching the shuttle was an awesome experience. Science can be very exciting!
