Yvonne Cagle was born in West Point, New York on April 24, 1959. She grew up to become the famous astronaut we all know. She participated in N.A.S.A.'s missions and is a big inspiration to many people. She received rewards and certificates by using her perseverance. She applied for helpful jobs and saved many lives. How she did all of this is the question.

First, Dr. Yvonne Cagle received a lot of certificates, proving her intelligence. Earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1977 shows her creativity. She also was awarded a Doctorate in Medicine from the University of Washington in 1985. She was able to provide aid to ill people. Finally, she received an honorary PH.D in Humanities. Her life follows the phrase, "Carpe Diem," which means "Seize The Day" because she went above and beyond the norm. She provides a strong inspiration for me.

Secondly, Cagle has experienced a lot of amazing events and jobs, showing her quality as a go-getter. She went through medical training sponsored by the Health Pro Scholarship program. This program provided her a commission as an officer with the U.S. Air Force. This accomplishment shows that she was skilled. In April 1988, Cagle became certified as a flight surgeon and was involved in providing medical aid during missions. Finally, she served as the deputy project manager for Kelsey-Seybold Clinics, practicing as an occupational physician at N.A.S.A.'s Johnson Space Center's occupational Health Clinic in Houston, Texas. She was a big help to many with her first aid expertise helping keeping people alive.

Third, Dr. Yvonne Cagle was a helpful participant at N.A.S.A.. She served as a surgeon and helped when people were wounded. Cagle volunteered to serve as

the Air Force Medical Liasson Officer for the STS-30 Atlantis shuttle mission to test the Magellan spacecraft. Finally, she completed two years of training and was qualified for flight assignment as a space shuttle mission specialist. She is a role model for young men and women everywhere.

Obviously, Dr. Yvonne Cagle is an awesome role model. She accomplished so much and her accomplishments are important because she gets money for a living and her skills improve health and the background knowledge for those of us interested in the expanding universe. 

#### **Space Weather (UCLA Presentation)**

On March 19,2015, two very special guests came to our fifth grade classes to teach about space weather!

Emmanuel and Zoe both work at

the Earth Planetary Space Science Department at UCLA! They showed us all about auroras and space weather.

We were interested in all of the new ideas we learned about space weather. We learned that 99.99% of plasma is in space. Also, we learned way more about the center of our solar system, the sun. For example, the sun gives off solar flares that cause auroras. Without the sun having solar flares, we wouldn't have the beautiful Northern and Southern Lights. These Auroras only happen near the North & South poles because Earth has an iron core causing a magnetic shield that blocks this solar radiation. This magnetic shield is weakest at the poles so that's why the auroras are visible there.

Have you ever wondered why we can see the sun's sunspots? The answer is because the sun rotates faster than earth so we can see all of the sun at one time or another. It takes 25 days to see a sunspot at the same spot you saw it previously.

They brought a miniature aurora that Emmanuel created to help explain this lesson. They also had a plasma ball that was cool because the electricity follows your finger when you touch the outside of it.

Learning about space weather was space-tastic! We hope that Emmanuel and Zoe come back for future students.

### Friends of the Island Fox

## **Black History Essay Contest**

#### Fifth Grade:

#### EMMETT TILL by - Heidy Paniagua

Emmett Louis Till was a fourteen year old boy that helped start the Civil Rights Movement. Emmett Till was born on July 25, 1941in Chicago, Illinois. His friends nicknamed him Bobo, which means a person that is crazy. Emmett's parents were Louis and Mamie Till. Emmett never knew his dad a private in the United States Army during World War 2. His mother was a clerk at the Air Force; she was in charge of confidential files. Emmett Till was a responsible, funny, and intelligent high spirited child. He suffered from Polio at the age of 5 but managed to make a full recovery, it left him with a slight stutter.

Unfortunately Emmett died at the early age of fourteen. His main accomplishments were graduating from the seventh grade from McCosh Grammar School and recovering from Polio. In 1955, Till's great uncle, Moses Wright came from Money, Mississippi to visit his family. Moses Wright was planning to take Till's cousin Wheeler Parker to Mississippi on his way back. When Emmett heard about this he pleaded his mother to allow him to visit his relatives. At the end Emmett's mother agreed to the idea. The day before Till left, his mother gave him a signed ring that belonged to his father. She also gave him information on proper behavior in the South. She told him "Be careful if you have to get down on your knees and bow when a white person goes past, do it willingly."

On the morning of August 24, 1955 Emmett and some friends entered Bryant's Grocery and Meat Market to buy refreshments. Before entering the store, Till showed some pictures of his white friends back home to some of the local boys outside the store. Once they saw the pictures the boys then dared Emmett to talk to the clerk of the store. The woman was the owner's wife Carolyn Bryant, she was very pretty. What happened next is still not clear. According to some Emmett flirted and wolf whistled at the owner's wife. To modern day society this may not be a big deal, but down South on the 50's this was considered a punishable crime. Four days later Roy Bryant and J. W. Milam showed up at Wright's house and kidnapped Emmett. Roy Bryant and J.W. Milam brutally killed Emmett. They beat him up, dragged him to the bank of the Tallahatchie River, shot him in the head, tied him with barbed wire to a large metal fan, and shoved his mutilated body into the water.

Emmett died on August 28, 1955. His body was pulled out of the river three days later. His face was beyond recognition and Wright only managed to identify him by the ring on his finger. His corpse was sent to Chicago were his mother had an open casket funeral. Thousands of people came to the Roberts Temple Church of God to see the evidence of the horrible, brutal, and hate crime. Emmett's murder had become a source of outrage and indignation throughout the country. His death brought nationwide attention to the racial violence and injustice prevalent in Mississippi.

My opinion of Emmett Till's life is that he did not deserve to have died at such a young age. How Roy Bryant and J.W. Milam murdered him was horrible. I understand how an African American wasn't able to speak to white women, but he was just fourteen years old! He could have become an artist, a musician, a poet or even a Civil Rights Activist. One of the books that helped me on my book report was A Wreath For Emmett Till by Marilyn Nelson. On one of the pages there was a piece of a poem that caught my attention. The words were, Its red sap pleads the case for its inclusion in the theme of a wreath for the memory of Emmet Till. Though the white poppy means forgetfulness, who could forget, when red sap on a wreath recalls the brown boy five white monsters killed. I understood that when I choose Emmett Till for my biography, it was going to be a challenge. He died at fourteen which means there was not that much to write about. His story has taught me that there are always consequences for your actions. Since Emmett was so young and immature he didn't realize he was putting himself in a dangerous position. He wanted to show off to his friends, and as a result he was killed. The positive side of this horrible crime was that months after Emmett's death the Civil Rights Movement began.

I would definitely recommend this biography to others. Reading about Emmett Till's life can seem sorrowful at moments, but it gets better along the way. While doing the biography on Emmett Till you learn many valuable lessons about life. You also get to learn and truly understand how the African Americans were treated in that time period. Whenever I read about Emmett's death, it brings one question to my mind. Why would someone do something so horrible and horrific? At school Ms. Mc Duffey is teaching us about African Americans almost every minute. She asked us one question, why do we treat each other and judge each other by how we look? We are all the same race, the human race. Those two questions are always played in my mind. May you rest in peace Emmett Till, for you have been a mighty part in our history.


